

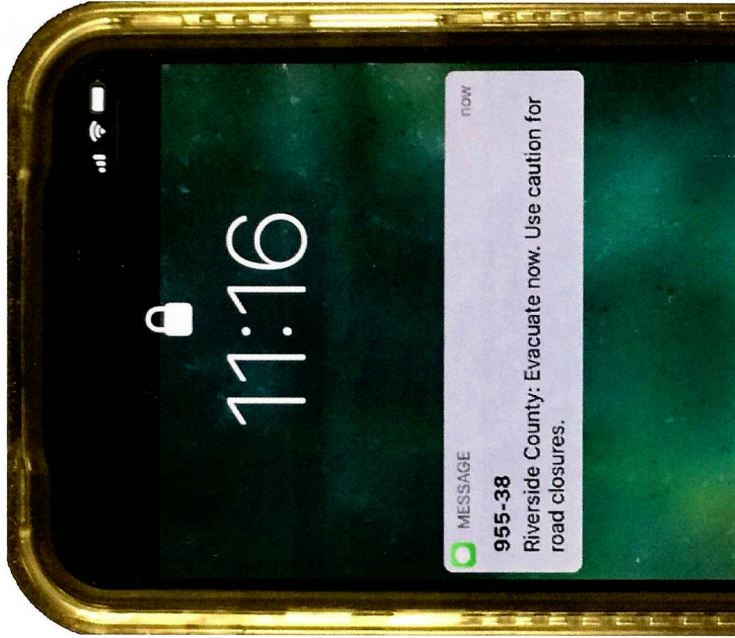

What will Alert RivCo be used for?

Alert RivCo is used to warn residents and businesses in Riverside County during emergencies such as wildfires, floods or hazardous materials incidents. It is part of a group of alert and warning tools used by Riverside County public safety agencies. Other systems include the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA).

I thought I was automatically enrolled?

Traditional, land line phone numbers are provided by the phone companies. Cell phones and Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) phones are not. Anyone who wants to get emergency notifications on their cell and VOIP phones must enroll in Alert RivCo.

Is this the same as the weather and Amber Alerts I already receive?

No. Weather alerts, Amber Alerts and Presidential alerts are controlled by various federal agencies. Alert RivCo is controlled by Riverside County agencies and only information about local emergencies is sent.

Can I get alerts on multiple devices?

Yes. You can enter the phone numbers of everyone in your household so each person will get alerts.

Will I get ads/non-emergency messages?

No. Though the Alert RivCo system may send occasional test messages, these are rare. All other messages sent by Alert RivCo will be related to specific emergencies and only sent to people impacted by the emergency.

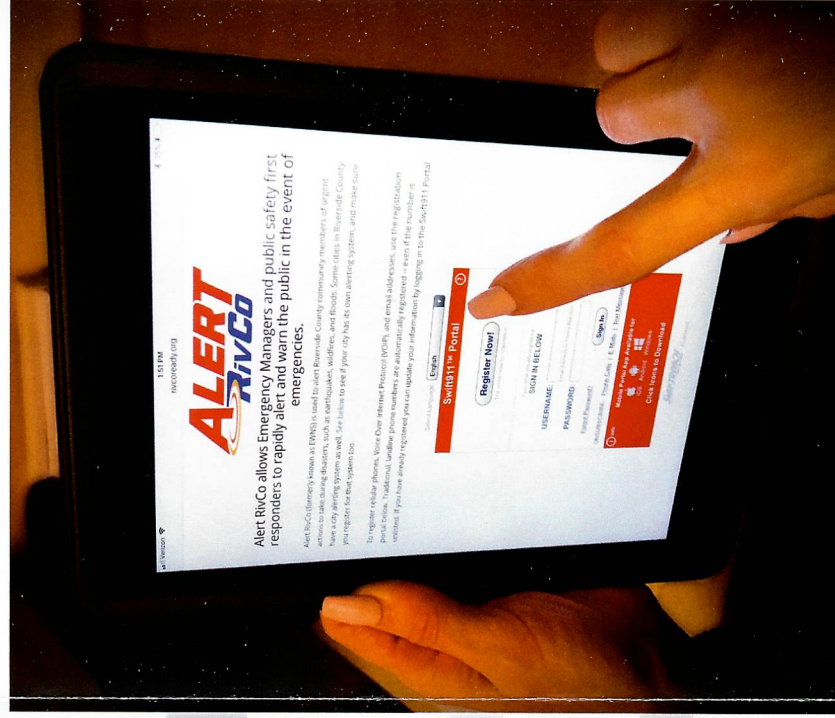
Does my information expire?

Information does not expire but we do recommend updating your information annually to ensure everything is current.

Sign up today

By enrolling you can make sure you get messages in the best format for you -- phone, text, or push notifications with the smartphone app.

Enrolling is easy and takes just a few minutes (check with your city to see if they use a different alerting system).

Prepare NOW!

Registering to receive emergency alerts is only one part of emergency planning. Your plan should include contacting an out of area person to let them know you are safe. People who plan for disasters usually recover from them quicker.

Make a Plan and a Kit

The best way to recover from disasters is to plan for them in advance. Your planning should include each person in your family. Consider having enough shelf stable food and water to last three to seven days. With electricity and internet outages, many businesses will only take cash. It's a good idea to keep cash on hand in smaller bills.

Other items to consider for your disaster preparedness kit include flashlights, a battery-powered radio, medications, important documents, cell phone chargers and anything else you might need if you were cut off from normal services.

Be sure to check your kit at least once a year to make sure everything is current and usable. As your family changes you should update your emergency supplies too.

With just a little effort preparing, you will be ready to survive and recover from most emergencies.
